Course Overview

Scholarship on Race and racism constitutes an important field in the social sciences in the USA that has led to impressive research and theorization for several decades now. Similarly, caste and caste-based discrimination are important themes in scholarship in the Indian subcontinent. USA and India are the oldest and largest democracies respectively, and both have diverse populations that differ by religion, ethnicity, race/caste, language, and culture. However, the almost parallel concepts of Race and Caste, and related social outcomes such as racism and casteism are usually seen as distinct from each other, and there are only a few recent attempts at building theoretical, conceptual, and empirical bridges between them. Both these scholarships can learn from each other, and there is potential for refining concepts based on such comparisons.

This interdisciplinary course discusses literatures about both these sets of concepts, focusing on similarities and differences. It will include a historically grounded review of theories that have been used to define, study, and understand these concepts, emphasizing the reasons that caused a shift in such understanding. We will also be reviewing debates on affirmative action in the USA and reservations in India and how they have evolved over time based on policy shifts and popular perceptions. Finally, this course connects these theoretical ideas and policies with data on actual outcomes that have been witnessed on the ground.

This course is proposed for a six-day schedule, with lectures and tutorials spread over the first five days, and the sixth day reserved for an exam. The course will run in a workshop mode where participants will play an active role in contributing to overall learning goals. Each of the five days will include a separate learning module where participants will read assigned materials, listen to lectures, participate in class activities, and take part in small group discussions, and plenary debriefings. Lectures will be delivered in an interactive manner so as to embrace questions and clarifications that participants will raise. This interactive method creates a high-impact learning atmosphere aimed at better outcomes. Tutorials will be utilized to engage participants in active learning exercises, and discussions aimed at complementing lectures. These tutorials will focus on problem solving and analysis that will be done by participants in small groups.

Course Objectives

- Expose participants to the historical literature on Caste in India, and Race in USA as these concepts are understood in the broader social sciences, and how this understanding has changed over time.
- Introduce participants to contemporary debates on affirmative action policies that have been proposed and implemented in both these contexts, as well as how these debates have contributed to changes in affirmative action policies over time.
- Review empirical findings on affirmative action outcomes in India and USA and understand the benefits and limitations of such policies.
- Participants will be able to discuss race, caste and related outcomes with academic as well as general audience outside the classroom.
- Participants will be able to design lectures and class-activities for their own course syllabi that they can offer in the future.
